

What to Bring to Browsea Version(1.2)

For a Day on the Water

- Clothes that can get wet/muddy
- A Broad Brim Sunsafe Hat (preferably one with a drawstring to keep on the head when windy)
- Good High SPF Sunscreen
- A drink bottle
- Enclosed shoes (that can get wet/muddy). **This includes Adults also.**
- Spray jacket (wind and waterproof)
- Swimming gear
- Prepacked Lunch (unless catered)
- Towels (for showering and for water activities)
- Plastic bags (for wet clothes)
- Strap for spectacles/sunglasses (string or otherwise)



For a Night on the Water

- Clothes (that can get wet/muddy)
- A drink bottle
- Enclosed shoes (that can get wet/muddy)
- Spray jacket (wind and waterproof for sailing)
- Towels (for showering and for water activities)
- Plastic bags (for wet clothes)
- Strap for spectacles/sunglasses (string or otherwise)
- Denim jeans are very uncomfortable when wet so please avoid wearing these for water activities
- Head torch (Optional)

NB: denim jeans are very uncomfortable when wet so please avoid wearing these for water activities.

Also for Overnight

- Your own sleeping gear (including pillows)
- A mess kit (knife fork spoon, plate bowl cup)
- Spare closed in shoes.

As a Group

- First aid kit
- Sunscreen with a High SPF
- Food
- Drinks (water or other)
- Clothes pegs (if wanting to hang out wet clothes without them blowing off the line)
- Wood (if planning to use the outside BBQ area or Pizza Ovens for cooking subject to BBC bylaws)
- Tents (if camping on-site rather than staying in the bunkhouse)

What to Bring

Can I wear my own lifejacket?

We understand that adults come in many shapes and sizes and we have taken steps to have a broad range from size 6 Maritime regulations and Queensland Scout Instructions (QBSI).

to XXXXL If you still need to bring your own, you need to be able to demonstrate it complies with both Queensland

This is a type 50S designed for people who don't want to be seen or found on the water, we would rather you didn't wear these at brownsea.



If you have an inflatable lifejacket, only for adults, we recommend manual inflation (especially in a dingy) and you need to be able to demonstrate to us you have a service log (not like this one which is all rusty...)



Older Type 2 or Type 3 Have been phased out in other states

Note: Lifejackets manufactured to standards AS1512, AS1499 or AS2260 are only compliant until the end of their serviceable life if the ship carrying them was equipped with them prior to 1 September 2016. The end of the serviceable life of a lifejacket occurs when the lifejacket needs to be replaced because it is irreparable, unserviceable, incapable of being restored to its original condition, or has reached the end of its serviceable life as stated by its manufacture
